


## How we teach handwriting in Year 1 and Year 2

In each of the pupils' writing books, the lines look like this.

The dashed line is to help with the **ascenders** and **descenders** that touch the top and bottom. The solid line is to help with **half ladder** letters, like a lowercase **o**. These extra guidelines help children to understand the sizing of letters and where they sit.

## <u>Print</u>


Print is lettering that has no joins. It is the letters formed at their simplest.

## Pre-cursive

Pre-cursive is letters with the joins **in** and **out** but they do not join together <u>yet</u>. At the end of the year, some pupils may start to join the lettering to make **cursive** letters.

## Handwriting is taught daily in this format:

- 1) The teacher models the focus letter(s).
- 2) Children have the opportunity to practise.
- 3) They receive 1:1 feedback.

At home, it would be helpful to practise letters in these ways, depending on your year group. You could do this through:

- writing them LARGE on big paper
- writing them in sand
- practising in the sky/ in the air
- practising using fancy pens!
- write it in slime
- paint it onto walls with a paint brush dipped in water
- use chalk on the pavement
- use sticks in mud
- practise it on someone's back (guess the letter)
